Practice, practice, practice...

circles-practice making lots of circles...50 of them! Fill an entire page with circles of all sizes. Remember to use your whole arm when you draw. They may overlap and be solid or transparent. Draw lightly at first keep to keep them as round as possible. Then, darken the lines when you are satisfied with the shape. Finally go back in to each circle and fill it in with a different texture or pattern. Make some light some dark others rough or smooth, but each one must be different.



Journa

On this page in your sketchbook record a days activities. You might show the people and interactions you had. What places did you go. And what experiences did you have. Perhaps using images like words in a story you could start in the upper left hand corner and start drawing and finish at the end of the day in the lower right hand corner. Or just start drawing and let the journal page grow all over the page like a vine.



Here's an opportunity to draw anything you like!

Free drawing #2: On a fresh page in your sketchbook draw anything you would like. It may be a fantasy picture, a drawing from a photo, a design or almost anything you can imagine. Draw large, utilize the entire page shade and include a background.

Free Drawing #3: *from life* This drawing may also be of anything you want but, it is drawn from life. That means you will pick something real, an actual object or group of objects to draw. It could be something out side your window, on your dresser, a pet or friend...anything as long as you are drawing from the actual objects.



These drawing are to be done outside of class, or if you have free time in class you may work on them there as well.
